FREMONT is located in Dodge County in the eastern part of the state of Nebraska along the Platte River. Fremont's population is 26,397 and has a total area of 8.85 square miles according to the 2010 census. Fremont is the county seat and the home of Midland University.

In March 2019, the City of Fremont was surrounded by floodwater. The Fremont Police Department assisted with rescue and evacuations. The department's MRAP (Mine-Resistant Ambush Protected) vehicle was integral in these efforts.





CITY ADMINISTRATOR

The City Administrator's Office is responsible for the overall coordination of activities among the governmental departments. These departments include Police, Fire, Parks & Recreation, Library, Public Works, and City Clerk. This office also prepares the government portion of the City's annual operating budget.

The City Administrator reports to the City's elected officials including the Mayor and Fremont's eight member City Council and works closely with the Greater Fremont Development Corporation on economic development projects. The Administrator also serves as the Plan Administrator for the City's various pension and deferred compensation plans and negotiates union contracts with union officials.



Lieutenant Kurt Bottorff joined the Fremont Police Department in 1994 as a Patrol Officer. He was promoted to Sergeant in 1998 and Lieutenant in 1999. Lt. Previously, he served as the Professional Standards Lieutenant where he addressed the media, social media, internal affairs, General Order needs, public relations, training, translator hiring and the Internship program. 

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

2019 CALLS BY MONTH




CALLS BY TIME OF DAY





Hazardous Citations/Violations = 639









DISPOSITIONS OF THE INVESTIGATIONS

35 UNFOUNDED: An investigation was conducted and there was no evidence a crime was committed.

153 CLEARED: An arrest was made or a citation was issued.

66 INACTIVE: The investigation is exhausted with little/no hope of solving the case or the nature of the case is such that the case couldn't reach a status such as cleared. (For example: A welfare check.)

13 ACTIVE: The investigation is ongoing and the detective is still working the case.

58 CLOSED BY OTHER ACTION

The Investigations Division is commanded by **Lieutenant Shane Wimer**. The division is responsible for the investigation of significant cases involving a special subject matter, jurisdictional implications and cases that are more complicated and often more time consuming. The Investigations Unit is also responsible for the collection and preservation of evidence. Normally, the detectives will become involved with an investigation after the initial response of the Uniformed Patrol Division. They are also responsible for conducting background investigations for any person applying for a solicitation permit or liquor license within the boundaries of Fremont.

Examples of significant cases involving a special subject matter include, but are not limited to:


- property crimes such as burglary, fraud and forgeries,
- physical and sexual assault, child abuse and neglect,
- death investigations with unusual or suspicious circumstances.

TRAINING / EDUCATION

Lieutenant Ed Watts directs the training program for the Fremont Police Department. Proper training of law enforcement officers has become an even more vital part of police agencies across the country. Officers are facing more serious issues than ever before and their survival depends on being properly trained. Our agency provides mandatory, optional and officer-requested training to all certified officers. Training from instructors within our agency is utilized as much as possible to keep costs down so that more training can be offered. The end result is that each officer is better prepared to face those serious issues both professionally and safely.




Officer Chad Smith was the Warrant Officer of the Year for 2019. Officer Smith was also Warrant Officer of the Year in 2018.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

The SRO works in all Fremont Public Schools and Archbishop Bergan Schools. There are a total of 14 schools the SRO assists. The SRO assists by providing mentoring and informal counseling to students and provides security and investigative expertise to the school system.

The SRO is responsible for the following:

- Investigates crimes that occur on school property. All types of crimes that occur within the city also occur within the schools. A few examples of crimes that occur include drug crimes, weapons, assaults, thefts, criminal mischief, parking complaints and gang identification.
- The SRO program has built good rapport and relationships with the students, staff and parents. Students come to speak with the SRO, sometimes on a daily basis, just to tell the SRO how their day is going.
- The SRO works closely with the School Truancy Officer, the Probation Office, the Dodge County Attorney’s Office, and the Juvenile Diversion Program.
- The SRO plays an important role in the Crime Stoppers program in the public school system. The Crime Stoppers program has been very successful because students know they can remain anonymous.
- The SRO conducts classroom/school visits where talks are given. These talks consist of educating students about drug and alcohol abuse, making proper choices in life, internet safety, and just general question and answer sessions.

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III CORPS DRUG TASK FORCE

III CORPS Drug Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional task force comprised of law enforcement agencies from Cuming, Dodge and Saunders counties, the cities of Fremont, Blair, Wahoo, and Yutan. III CORPS' inception was in October of 1997. The geographic area covered by the task force represents approximately 1,900 square miles, with a population of approximately 75,000 people including the 26,397 living in Fremont, Nebraska. The Task Force currently has three agents assigned to work cases in our geographic area. The Task Force is headquartered in Fremont, Nebraska. The Fremont Police Department provides two agents. The agents report directly to the III CORPS board of directors consisting of the department heads from six of the agencies located within the area of operation.

The Task Force is funded through the participating agencies. The individual agencies allocate whatever funds and resources available to support the Task Force's operations. The pooling of inter-departmental assets, the unanimous dedication to our community and the timely infusion of federal funds has kept the III CORPS Drug Task Force in operation.





Through a grant obtained by III CORPS, the Fremont Police Department currently offers a NADDI (National Association of Drug Diversion Investigators) drop box allowing the public a safe and secure way to dispose of prescription drugs and helping to keep these drugs off the streets.

The Rx Drug Drop Box is located in the lobby of the Fremont Police Department located at 725 N. Park Ave., where prescription pills can be discarded. The drop box is available from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Officers also will take pills at other times.

2019 NOTABLE EVENTS

February 2019 – A blizzard left 11 inches of snow behind, leaving motorists stranded and streets impassible. Officers kept busy assisting stranded motorists, clearing roadways of stranded cars and taking accident reports.

March 2019 – Beginning March 14th, historic flooding occurred on the Platte and Elkhorn rivers causing highway closures and making travel in and out of Fremont impossible. First Responders and volunteers worked tirelessly to rescue those who were displaced from their homes; providing food, water and clothes, and protecting vacant properties from vandalism or looting.



April 2019 – One man was killed and another man injured at the Lincoln Premium Poultry and Costco chicken processing plant after they fell approximately 40 feet from a basket in which they were working. The accident was investigated by the Fremont Police Department Detective Bureau and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).

April 2019 – The Fremont Police Department participated in the annual “Prescription Drug Take Back Day” campaign. 11 boxes of unused/expired prescription medications were collected with a total weight of 231 pounds.

April 2019 – A 32-year-old woman from Manden, North Dakota was arrested on suspicion of child abuse and drug possession after she was stopped for a traffic violation and a search of her car yielded methamphetamine and hallucinogenic mushrooms. The drugs were found in the passenger compartment and within reach of two minor children.

Between May – June 2019 – The Fremont Police Department participated in the “Click it or Ticket” campaign. During that time, Fremont Officers contacted 304 vehicles total and wrote 66 citations. The citations were for offenses including, but not limited to, DWI, Driving During Suspension and driving with no insurance.

June 2019 – Officer Howard Hanson retired from the department after 30 years of service. Officer Hanson spent his career in the patrol division. He and his wife still live in the Fremont area.



2019 NOTABLE EVENTS

September 2019 – Following an investigation that spanned several months and involved multiple agencies, the 52-year-old owner of a Fremont massage parlor was arrested after it was learned that the massage parlor was being used as a front for prostitution.

September 2019 – Lieutenant Glen Still retired from the department after 33 years of service. During his tenure, Lt. Still supervised the department’s motorcycle patrol, was an accident investigator, taught emergency cruiser operations and he was the acting Administrative Lieutenant at the time of his retirement.



October 2019 – The Fremont Police Department, in partnership with the Dodge County Sheriff’s Office and the Fremont/Dodge County Communications Center, implemented a new public safety software solution. This system allows our departments to share data to better serve our community.

October 2019 – Officers from the Fremont Police Department joined Nebraska State Patrol troopers, Dodge County deputies and Fremont Fire Department personnel in a ceremony at Fremont Contract Carriers where two truck trailers with wraps honoring first responders were unveiled for the first time.



October 2019 – A 65-year-old Fremont man was arrested after he went into a sporting goods store to purchase a magazine for a handgun. The clerk working at the store recognized the handgun as one that was stolen from the store in August. The man was questioned by Fremont Police and admitted to stealing the gun previously.

November 2019 – The First State Bank & Trust, located in the 200 block of north Main Street, was robbed by a lone man brandishing a firearm. Fremont Police Detectives were able to identify the man and on December 3rd he was arrested in Missouri.

November 2019 – Members of the Fraternal Order of Police, Lodge #37 participated in their annual “Shop With A Cop” campaign in conjunction with the local Walmart store. Over 90 children from the Fremont area received \$100 each to buy clothes and toys, accompanied by our officers. The children are nominated by the Fremont Public Schools and the money spent is collected through private donations.

December 2019 – For two days in December, several members of the police department conducted traffic stops, but instead of tickets, the officer handed the violators a holiday card containing a \$100 bill. 50 of the cards were handed out. The cash was provided to the police department by an anonymous donor.
